How are we doing financially? We are doing OK but could do more with your help. Two things deserve your attention. First, the categories called "pass thru" are not predicted in our annual budget but are the monies donors give for a named scholarship to honor a class or alum or donated in response to a special campaign to raise campus support for a specific need. Whatever we collect for a campaign or for named scholarships is what we give away that year.

Second, scholarships we award in one year are not all collected in the same year, depending on how a student registers or delays his or her education. So we track carefully the money we have promised but not yet paid out. We do budget and track the dues income and expenses of the newsletter printing and mailing, our insurance policy, and supporting the picnic and Legacy Exhibit. We are pretty good at predicting those dues and expenses.

# Varsity Basketball Earns Its Place in Spartan History

The Spartan varsity basketball team started their rollercoaster season by losing preseason games left and right. As the team rolled into the league games, few would have expected them to find any success. But, led by Head Coach

Freddie Bryant and Team Captains Nanik Tagore & Cesar Baranjo, the Spartans won EIGHT league games in a row. Coaches and players then set their sights on a league championship.

The Spartans averaged 54 points per game over the entire season and improved their point average to 61 points a game during league play. They scored a team high of 102 points against Highlands. San Juan Senior, Nanik Tagore, had 9 three-pointers, including 5 in a row early in the second half against Highlands. The Spartans won each of their league games by an

average of 21 points. Ultimately, the team defeated Casa Roble 69 - 48 in a playoff game and won a league championship with a record of 11 - 1! This is the first league championship since 2012, and the first time making it into the playoffs since 2017.

# Make San Juan Great Again

Many of us Alums remember attending San Juan High when enrollment was above 2,000. Now it is under 800. Many blame the District adopting "open Enrollment" as a reason for San Juan losing students to other high schools. The District convened a Board Workshop on Open Enrollment last month. Here are some key points:

- Open Enrollment is required by and guided by State law.
- Open enrollment is widely used throughout the District by families of all income levels, all races, and all language groups.
- The District's open enrollment period each year grants attendance at a requested school until that school's extra capacity is filled.

The District tracks the percentage of students who "transfer out" of each school. Every school, even high performing schools, has at least some parents who request to open-enroll at a different school. The "whys" may include safer route to walk to school, school near parents' work locations or near a family member for after school care, specialized programs, or leaving a K-8 school in favor of a 6-8 middle school.

For high schools, the low "transfer out" rate is at Bella Vista where 21% of parents and students desire to attend elsewhere. So even a successful high school may not have the geography or program a family prefers. The high transfer out rate is at San Juan High School where 69% of families living in the attendance area ask to attend high school elsewhere.


Current Open Enrollment priorities give strong preference to parents or students who request to leave a school that receives Federal Title I funds, or in other words, schools in poorer neighborhoods. This priority policy has had the long-term effect of driving schools in low-income neighborhoods into a downward spiral.

As parents in a poor neighborhood transfer their children to a school in a wealthier neighborhood, the low-income school has fewer students. With fewer students, fewer classes, sports and extracurricular programs can be offered, prompting more students to transfer out. I pointed out at the Workshop that parents in poor neighborhoods currently believe the District will deliver a better education to their students at a school in a richer neighborhood.

How does San Juan High School climb up out of this downward spiral? Forcing students to attend while the family believes it delivers a lesser education is unlikely to succeed. Parents will find a way to get their students to schools they believe in. Instead, San Juan High must:

- Deliver a superior education and be sure that this superiority is well known,
- Offer specialized programs that are highly desirable and publicize those programs.
- Offer other benefits such as jobs, family support, college and apprenticeship access better than other schools.

San Juan High needs extremely strong leadership dedicated to a long-term plan, and it needs your support to make it the most successful high school in the District.

# Meet Rich Giusti, Class of 1965

Lots of Giusti's on the San Juan roster: Rich, his father, Joe, uncles Johnnie and Emil and brother Bob start the count. These men descended from immigrants in Italy's Luca region. Most made careers with Roseville's Southern Pacific Railroad.

Rich's father served in the Army during World War II. His name was drawn at random to receive letters from girls back home. Roeley Sargentini from Ukiah drew his name. She wrote to him. He wrote back. And after he returned home, he looked her up. The rest is history.

Rich's father volunteered as the Institutional Representative from the American Legion to Boy Scout Troop 228. Many future San Juan alumni benefited from his leadership and character. The Giusti family were avid bird hunters. Rich still has his father's shotguns and is himself a competitive trap shooter.

While Rich attended San Juan, his class numbered 542. The District built schools as quickly as it could, trying to keep up with the baby boom. Rio Americano, Casa Roble, and Mesa Verde high schools were not built yet when Rich started at San Juan.

After graduation, Rich attended American River Junior College and Sacramento State

College, graduating in 1970 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism and a minor in English. While at Sac State, a San Juan classmate suggested he join the Davis Police Department as a reserve officer and that started Rich's lifelong career in various areas of law enforcement.

Rich served as a fingerprint specialist and firearms analyst for the California Department of Justice in Sacramento. In 1989, he was hired as a Special Investigator for the CA Dept. of Food and Agriculture, responsible for weights, measures and fuel quality. That job meant a lot of travel for Rich and even some undercover work. In 2001, he promoted to Supervising Special Investigator at the Meat and Poultry Inspection Branch from which he retired in 2012.

Rich married Mary Schneider '68 in 1971. They have two children, Christie and Anthony (Tony). He and Mary have three grandchildren, Madeline, Dominic, and Olivia. Madeline is a freshman at Gonzaga University in Washington.

Rich was among the earliest members of the Alumni Association, joining in 1981. He remembers Nick Tomich and other founders. Rich and his father both served twice as SJAA President. He has served as Membership Chair for about twenty years, using his knowledge of databases to keep track of Association memberships. Rich has maintained his belief in the purpose of the Association since he first joined.

#### **Duncan-Toscano SJHS Connection**

Mark Duncan's connection to San Juan High goes back to his grandmother, Goldie Mosburg, who graduated in 1936. Mark graduated in 1975, so he missed seeing his wife, Marie Toscano-Duncan '81, at school. But they each had siblings who were in the same classes at San Juan. One day Marie walked into the J&W Auto Wrecking Yard, owned by Mark's father, for parts for her '77 Jeep. Mark was working the counter at the time. He recognized her name and they made the San Juan connection.

Mark had started working at C&C Auto Parts when he was 14 on weekends, sweeping up for \$5 a day. Then he made deliveries, pulled parts, kept the inventory and learned to work the counter. Mark's family bought J&W Auto Wreckers in 1981. They specialized in AMC/Rambler vehicles, so fittingly his sister Pam '74 had a 1969 Rambler American for her first car. Mark had a brand new red Ford courier pickup, purchased for \$2,100. The business added Jeeps to its inventory and that continues today.

Mark grew up at Mariposa and Old Auburn. He attended Citrus Heights Elementary and Sylvan Middle Schools. At San Juan, Mark played soccer for Coach (later Principal) Terwilliger. He remembers Mrs. Simpson's "bachelor living" class that was valuable for balancing a checkbook, meal planning, and grocery shopping. He liked the electrical shop class from Mr. Theoboldt.

Marie lived at Mariposa and Madison. Her family moved from Connecticut in 1968. She attended Skycrest Elementary and Carnegie Middle Schools. At San Juan, she was a social butterfly, making friends Vickie Emerson and Jeanne Foley, who she stays in touch with to this day.

She played tennis and loved to attend football games and dances. Mrs. (Mama) Jacoby was a favorite teacher. Connie Spicklemire's art class was fun too. When Marie's daughter, Savannah,

later took the art class, she found a photo of Marie and some friends still hanging in Mrs. Spicklemire's office. She took sewing in high school, but that's not why she now owns a quilting shop.

Runs with Scissors came about in 2008 when she felt ready for a change from her 30-year career as a dental assistant and turned her quilting hobby into a business. She knew about small business

from Marks' long career and also because her father owned a painting contracting company. The shop sells materials, offers classes and will do pattern stitching to finish clients' quilts. During the pandemic, Marie's business was classified

# **Meet Barbara Morarity Van Dyke '77**

The Morarity name would be "on the podium," to use an Olympics expression, if there were a contest for the most number of San Juan grads. Barbara was one of six from her family to attend San Juan. She attended Coyle Avenue Elementary and Will Rogers Junior High before San Juan.

Barb credits her upbringing with the energy she and her husband, John Van Dyke, show in running their own business for 42 years. Barb's parents would pay half of things that were desired but discretionary, and required their children to earn the other half. If Barb wanted to attend a football game for \$2, she had to put her dollar on the table, then mom would give her the second dollar. The same rule applied to the \$200 car insurance for her 1961 Oldsmobile when Barb turned 16. Most of that money came from babysitting jobs at the rate of 50 cents an hour.

At San Juan, Barb loved math classes from Mr. Phillips and Mr. Lehman. She took every business class she could from Mr. Daniels and Mr. Sakamoto. She enjoyed the sewing classes but regrets not taking cooking classes, as she doesn't consider herself a very good cook.

Barb participated in the annual Powder Puff Football game between junior girls and senior girls and laughs remembering the boys dressed as Powder Puff cheerleaders.

The girls of the Class of 1977 have stayed close and often travel together or meet often. Barb calls them the "Dining Divas of the 70's." Barb remembers being shy in high school but credits classmates like Valerie Toney with pulling her into activities at school. She was also pulled out of her shell by the Catholic Youth Organization. The CYO named Barbara "Miss Holy Family". She had to represent the church at picnics and

community events for a year.

Barb studied accounting at American River College. But she had to keep working to earn her half of all expenses. She worked part-time at the Liberty House department store and then full time at Bank of the West on Greenback Lane. (cont.)

In 1978, she and John became engaged. Both worked full-time and took night classes, Barb in accounting and John in welding. Barb remembers him making things in the evenings and selling them at Denio's Auction on weekends. They bought a house in 1982. The 800 square foot house had a 1500 square foot shop in back where John worked on ever increasingly sophisticated metal projects.

Barb joined the SJAA in 1982, only three years after its creation. She was recruited when Virginia Owens, '39 came into the bank where Barb was working and asked for a donation for a newsletter ad. #### **Incredible Detention**


Richard Deatherage, class of '81, was an Air Force brat and a die-hard entrepreneur. His family took root in Citrus Heights in 1976 after his father retired. Richard had several small revenue producing ventures at the time, so San Juan High School was not one of his favorite subjects.

One day, San Juan Principal Charlie Berger caught Richard cutting one of his least favorite classes as he had done so many times before. It was Mr. James Theoboldt's drafting class. Charlie gave Richard detention.

Mr. Theoboldt was aware of Richard's situation and wanted to engage him. He knew that Richard was bored with remedial drafting exercises. So he offered Richard the chance to draft and design a real custom home plan during his time in detention. Richard jumped at the offer.

Drafting a complete set of plans for someone at Richard's age is not easy. So Mr. Theoboldt spent some time to mentor Richard on the project. Richard recalls many occasions where the two of them would jump into Mr. Theoboldt's pick -up truck and drive to a local construction site. Mr. Theoboldt took Richard to construction sites at various stages of completion to help him visualize what he was attempting to draw. (cont.)

Richard completed the set of plans during his time in detention and they were accepted by the Sacramento County Planning Department. Richard had designed and drafted his first custom home at the age of 16. He loved it. There was no turning back.

For the remainder of his time at San Juan, Richard enrolled in the ROP program and interned with a local architect, Robert Schaffer & Associates. He spent half of his time in class and the other half drafting plans.

After graduating, Richard enrolled at Sierra College to become an architect. But he soon found a repeat of his San Juan experience. His classes were boring and most of what they were teaching he had already learned.

So Richard dropped out of college and went to work as a finish carpenter for John Mourier Construction. Richard enjoyed the hands-on experience, but did not lose his focus. With determination and finished sets of plans as work samples, he parlayed himself into an architectural drafting position in less than two years. At the age of 20, Richard became the youngest Project Coordinator/Architectural Draftsman in the State of California.

In the next five years, Richard was involved in drafting about 2,000 homes in 12 residential developments. Then in 1987, he started his own drafting service for developers throughout Northern California.

Richard started drafting just before the computer age, drawing plans with a mechanical lead pencil on vellum paper. He liked doing it that way. When computer aided drafting (CAD) systems came into being, he did not have any inkling to embrace them. In 2009, Richard drew his last set of plans, unable to compete with CAD systems.

Richard then reinvented himself. Starting from scratch, he strapped on his old tool belt and went back to work as a finish carpenter. But with his knowledge and experience, quickly worked his way up to construction superintendent. Today, Richard supervises the construction of large commercial buildings up and down the west coast.

Richard made regular trips back to San Juan with his latest set of plans in hand, excited to show them to Mr. Theoboldt, who in turn would proudly show the plans to his students, then hang them up on the classroom wall for all to see.

On one of these San Juan trips to drop off his latest creation, Richard was looking for Mr. Theoboldt's mailbox when a counselor noticed him. The counselor pulled Richard aside and informed him that Mr. Theoboldt had recently passed away. At this point in my interview with Richard, we had to stop. He was momentarily unable to speak. To this day, Richard grieves for the loss of his mentor and friend, who so greatly helped to shape his life.

Richard has many more interesting stories. In 2008, his father encouraged him to write an autobiography. He did. And he titled it after his penchant for mechanical pencils. The "The Last of the Lead Holders" is available on Amazon.

#### The Promise

Andrea "Andi" Horton-Willey, class of '83, had a very disadvantaged childhood. Raised by a single working mom, she and her two older siblings suffered neglect and abuse. They knew what it was like to be cold and hungry. Their house had no curtains. Windows broken by the Roseville railyard explosion years earlier were never repaired.

Andi and her brother had to to fend for themselves. While mom was with a boyfriend, they drove her car at night, sometimes in the rain, to nearby construction sites to scavenge scrap wood to burn in the fireplace to keep warm. On a certain day at 4:00pm every week, Andi and her brother hid near a local grocery store dumpster, waiting for any edible produce that would be discarded. She was 12 at the time.

With low selfesteem and a severe lack of emotional development, Andi was ill prepared to start her time at San Juan. She found it difficult to relate to kids who came from "normal" families where daily living was not a struggle. She received

straight F's her first semester and was sent to continuation school with the hope that she could at least learn enough to pass the GED.

Andi fit in better socially with the kids at continuation school, but academically she did not. Teachers began to notice her intellectual ability. She finished assignments in a matter of minutes that it should have taken her days.

Despite a reluctance on her part to return, she was sent back to San Juan.

Andi was placed in Mr. Chase's English class. One day, Mr. Chase had each student spell a word and use it in a sentence. He gave Andi the word, "evanescent." Andi spelled the word correctly, then said, "adolescence is evanescent." Mr. Chase stopped the class and asked Andi to step outside. He grabbed her by the arm and briskly walked her down the hall. Bewildered, Andi tried to figure out what she had said that was offensive, thinking she was being taken to the principal's office. Mr. Chase ushered Andi into Mr. Terwilliger's Advanced Placement English class. Introducing the two of them, he said to Mr. Terwilliger, "she belongs in your class."

Andi began to receive support at school. She remembers her PE teacher, Mrs. Lee, school nurse, Mrs. Welty and a cheerleader, Lisa Dwelly as being encouraging and helping her to

feel good about herself. But the one supportive person who stood out above everyone else at San Juan was her counselor, Bob Cornwell.

Mr. Cornwell understood Andi's fear of failure, and how it might prevent her from achieving

what she was truly capable of. So he continually encouraged Andi to aim higher. He arranged and prompted her to take classes and tests that would keep her moving upwards. He also helped her to get a work permit and a job when she was 14. (cont.)

This enabled her to move out of her abusive home and live with her boyfriend, who would later become her husband.

Near the end of her senior year, Mr. Cornwell helped Andi to prepare for life after San Juan. She loved animals, so he encouraged her to get a job working with animals and asked if she'd thought about becoming a Veterinarian. Andi was shocked. No one in her family had ever gone to college.

On her last visit to Mr. Cornwell, he told her that she was 6 credits shy of graduating. But then he said, "don't worry, I'll take care of it." Then Mr. Cornwell said something that made a lasting impression on Andi. She remembers that he looked at her report card, then looked at her with a "passion and intensity" that she was not expecting, and said very emphatically, "promise me you will go to college." Andi said, "Okay, I promise," without the slightest idea if or how she would ever be able to do this.

A couple of weeks later, Andi's friend, Lisa Dwelly, urged her to go to the graduation ceremony. Andi said, "no" but Lisa was insistent. At the ceremony, Andi was "dumbfounded" when she received a \$500 scholarship from the San Juan Alumni Association - a first step towards her promise to Mr. Cornwell.

Andi used her scholarship to attend a vocational school and became a registered veterinary technician. She spent the next 10 years in this field. Andi took classes at night, but working full time made it hard for her to get beyond community college. When Andi did submit her transcript to a four year institution, the floodgates opened. She was awarded two full-ride scholarships, one of which allowed her to study anything she wanted anywhere in the world. Andi said she felt like a "kid in a candy store."

Andi studied at the University College of London for a while before returning home to earn a BS in Biochemistry at UC Davis. She then decided to go to medical school, graduating from the UCSF School of Medicine in 2000. Andi then completed an internship at Yale University and did her residency in Dermatology at the University of Minnesota. Andrea Horton-Willey fulfilled her promise to Mr. Cornwell.

Dr. Andrea Willey is now a Surgical Dermatologist who teaches at UC Davis. She lectures, does research, publishes and serves as a consultant for companies that develop laser and energy-based devices to prevent skin cancer. In recent years,

she opened a surgical Dermatology practice on Fair Oaks Boulevard in Sacramento.

Dr. Willey was not able to thank Mr. Cornwell for what he did for her. She tried but was unable to get in touch with him before he passed away in 2013. This article is based on a narrative that she wrote to the San Juan Alumni Association, expressing her gratitude to Mr. Cornwell. She ends with these words: "Mr. Cornwell's caring and passion made all the difference to me and I am forever grateful... I cannot express in words my gratitude for the promise he made me keep and for the opportunity to share it with you."



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
