The 1st San Juan Spartan


Well, we in the press have to publicly correct our errors, so we begin with reporting that the 1st San Juan High graduate, Dorothy Jerauld, <u>does</u> have a marker on her gravesite. We were previously directed to the wrong wall at Mt. Vernon Cemetery. At the time of her death, Dorothy was going by her 2nd married name, McNabb.




Bronze marker on Dorothy's crypt at Mt. Vernon

The "pretty little bungalow" built for Dorothy and her first husband, Arthur Broadley, on Buena Vista Avenue is sadly long gone. A 1921 parcel map (below) shows the lot in the lower left corner transferred to Arthur from his father. We confirmed with a descendent that the bungalow had been torn down for a newer house.

Madison Ave. would be at the top of this 1921 map today Happily, we heard from Jack Dozier,



from Jack Dozier, class of 1962, who is probably Dorthy's closest living relative. He is a first cousin twice removed. (Dorothy's father is the brother of Jack's great grandmother). He supplied an image of Dorothy's wedding license for her marriage to Arthur Broadley. He also reports that Arthur attended San Juan with Dorothy in 1913-14, but did not stay to graduate.



Instead, he joined the Army and served in France as a mechanic during WWI. We'll follow his story in a later issue.

What did Dorothy do in her adult life? Her job with the State of California moved her to Oakland and then back to Sacramento with second husband, Marvin McNabb, '27. Later, she worked for the federal government at McClellan Field and finished her career at Stead Air Force Base outside Reno as a purchasing agent.

Dorothy's life outside working hours and after retirement is easy to follow. As in her youth, Dorothy was well covered by the newspaper society columns. The Folsom Telegraph covered the Or-



angevale and Fair Oaks area, and Dorothy appears often in the paper, including in a few photos. The photo to the left is the first one we have been able to find of Dorothy. She served as a Grand Noble IOOF of the Rebecca Lodge, as Publicity Chair of the Folsom Garden Club and she was a member of the Orangevale Women's Club.

San Juan's 1st alumna led a full life and

kept her ties to the local area. We salute you, Dorothy!

More on San Juan's Land Acquisition

Larry Fritz, '73 came across a 1925 county parcel map that shows the original 10 acre parcel donated by W. A. Trainor for San Juan Union High School. Trainor was a developer who coined the name, "Citrus Heights", for his subdivisions. The fact that he donated a sizable amount of land for the school is why residents voted to locate San Juan where it is today, rather than a competing site in Fair Oaks.


To the right of the San Juan parcel is a 10 acre parcel owned by M. M. and C. H. Taylor. In the April, 2023 edition, we reported that the Taylors gave up their house so a football stadium could be built next to the school. But it wasn't just a house that the Taylors gave up for the stadium. The map shows that they gave up their entire 10 acre property for the school.

Martin M. Taylor must have known that San Juan would outgrow it's original 10 acre lot. As reported on in the July, 2023 edition, he purchased another 10 acre lot off of Mariposa Avenue, south of Greenback, and built a second home on that lot.

San Juan most likely acquired the Taylor parcel in phases, as some of it would have been needed for B Hall and the Auditorium that were built in 1939. The stadium was constructed in about 1952, which is when the Patterson family purchased the Taylor house and moved it to its' present location on Patterson Lane.

An interesting side note: longtime San Juan Librarian, Phebe Cale, rented a room from the Taylors and lived there for many years. In her memoirs, Phebe tells how she took a sabbatical in the early '50s and went to Hawaii for several months. When she left, the Taylor house was still in its' original location. When she returned, the house was gone. She was unaware of what had happened until she returned. What a surprise!





San Juan eventually outgrew both 10 acre parcels and acquired portions of other surrounding properties. According to the Sacramento County Assessor's Map, the school presently occupies 33.5 acres.

Meet our District Trustee Manuel Perez

The San Juan District is now required to elect its of Board of Trustees from specific Trustee Areas. San Juan High School falls into Area 7, served by newly elected Trustee Manuel Perez. SJAA President Larry Fritz and Newsletter Editor Dick Cowan sat down to ask Trustee Perez about his views.

Tell us about yourself. Well, I attended Encina High, and my wife and two adult sons attended Mesa Verde High. My daughter is now at Sylvan and will attend Mesa. I am a teamster truck driver for Coca



Cola. I volunteer with the Marysville Police Department. My wife and I have always been very close to our kids' schools, and I decided to run for the School Board to work on school site safety and parental involvement in decisions affecting their children.

What did you learn running for the Board? I had run once for Citrus Heights City Council, so I knew what to expect somewhat. As I knocked on doors campaigning, many older voters said "Oh, my kids are all grown up, it doesn't matter who is on the Board." I reminded them that the local school test scores and reputations are a huge factor in their home value. If they planned to sell their homes later, the schools matter. I also decided I would not accept campaign funds from the teachers' union, which seemed like a conflict of interest to me.

What came as a surprise after you were elected? The number of items that come to us that are strictly financial in nature. I get it that the money is necessary, but I am surprised how little time we have for the kids and learning issues. I want to get along with everyone, even if I disagree with them. The man who ran against me for the Board seat is on a district committee.

I could have removed him after I was elected, but I felt that he was doing good work, so I didn't. He is good for the kids, so he's good for me too.

Is being a Trustee a big time commitment? Oh yes. The packet of information we have to study for each Board meeting is about 4 inches thick. And it is all important. I highlight things I want to understand better. We have been adopting District policies and I asked our attorney to advise us on whether the language in several policies was driven by law or at our discretion. I didn't agree with some policy language but would accept it, if required by law. She will bring those policy language answers back to our next Board meeting.

Thank you for serving as a Trustee and please let us know how we can help you. I will turn that around, call me anytime I can help you.

David was not welcomed at San Juan when he first showed up. He was assigned to the English department. The department chairman was Eda Silverthorne. She had her heart set on a drama teacher to round out her diverse department. What she got was a coach. She made her disappointment

San Juan often suffered declining enrollment and many teachers got pink slipped. Dave and Linda Jacoby were on the list. Two outstanding teachers that San Juan could not afford to lose. Eda made the decision to retire so that Dave and Linda would be saved

When Dave served at principal of San Juan High School, it was a difficult job. The Superintendent at the district office told him to work smart. How do you work smart without resources? Many of the students couldn't speak English. The student population was always changing. The number of freshmen

who stayed to graduate was very small.

Dave was born in Denver and lived in six other towns in the Rockies. He claims Pinedale as his home because it's such a beautiful place where he met and married his wife, Sue. She scoffs at the idea of love at first sight, but 55 years of marriage provide a different argument.

Dave learned to fly at Rock Springs, Wyoming, in 1979 while he was working at his father's bank. Banking was not for Dave. He and his family moved back to Citrus Heights. This time he was welcomed back to San Juan. Lots of coaching awaited him. Dave was a regular at before-school basketball. Teachers and students played very aggressive games. Former San Juan faculty members and friends meet every Tuesday for breakfast. Dave is a regular. Everyone has a story. We like to tell stories about San Juan, talk about books we are reading, what's wrong with the world, trials and tribulations of old age and our recalcitrant children. Bottom line, with friends like Dave, San Juan is a great place to be from.


San Juan Alum Donates 2.2 Acres to Citrus Heights

More than two acres of wooded land along Sylvan Road are set to become a park after the landowner donated the property to the

city for that purpose. The landowner, Robert Coronado, approached Councilman Tim Schaefer more than a year ago with the idea, Schaefer said in comments during a Dec. 14, 2023, council meeting. He described Coronado as "a great human being" for his generosity.

In public comments during the meeting, Coronado said his grandparents, Manuel and Francisca Coronado, whom he said homesteaded a portion of the property in the 1920s after immigrating from Mexico.

"The property ties in well with the city's General Plan goal of preserving and protecting open space, which in turn helps reduce the effects of climate change," Coronado said. He also indicated the future park will be named "Coronado Park" in honor of his family's legacy.

The properties are located at 7500 Coronado Ln., which fronts Sylvan Road to the west and is adjacent to Heights Church in the north. Coronado said he purchased the land from the Heights Church to prevent it from becoming a parking lot, noting that some of the trees on the property are more than a century old.

Mayor Bret Daniels also thanked Coronado for his gift to the city. "This kind of thing hardly ever happens and your graciousness to us is extremely appreciated. Thank you very much, and go Spartans," Daniels said to the fellow San Juan alumni.

A staff report from the city said the land transfer was proposed as a gift to the city, "without any compensation," with a restriction only that the area be used as a "park, open space, community garden, or the like."

Horner is not done winning yet. When looking to the future, he said he wants to continue growing the athletics program at Casa Roble and expanding its positive influence on the community.


'Sixteen Candles' actress on the love she shared with her dad
